


We finished our usual tournaments and we consider it to be a successful year. We continued with our regular practices on Monday and Wednesday and got a good turnout through the fall.

We have also discussed some ideas to excite you the membership for the coming season. Some Ideas don't come to fruition, while others you will see in the future



## Wednesday is Seniors' Day

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#### DOWN MEMORY LANE - Canadian Championships Burnaby in 1975 – Jerry Melissa

The picture was taken in my 2nd Canadian Championship. The year before I had travelled by plane to Ottawa where I placed in the top 10. Elmer Hohl was dominating all tournaments at the time: including the World Tournaments. He and Bob Timothy (1974 B.C. Champion) were good friends, having met in the 'World's Tournament' in 1974. My recollection was that we paid Elmer's airfare, etc to Come to Burnaby. Like today, eastern players do not Come west voluntarily.

As I mentioned, Burnaby did a great job hosting the Championships. In the Men's division, games were unlimited shoes to 50 points. Both Elmer Hohl (many times Canadian and World Champion) and myself were undefeated until the final game. He threw in the high 80s and I threw 69% and only scored 19 points. He was fantastic.



However the highlight of the tournament was when the beer company came to shoot an ad. They asked Elmer to throw a 'shoe around the glass beer bottle and peg abutting each other' for a ringer. I believe the company was 'Molson's'! They arrived with miles of film and took more than an hour to set up. Elmer asked them what was that all about. They said they would shoot film until he made the shot. He said 'I'll do it on the first toss'! And he did!!!!!!

In his game against his friend Bob Timothy, Elmer was winning 46 to zero when he turned towards the crowd and scorekeeper and asked what the score was. He then threw his first shoe, hitting the top of the Peg and it deflected to the right hand corner of the pit. He threw his second shoe to the top of the peg and it deflected

to the left hand corner of the pit. Bob then threw a 'double'! The score ended up 52 to 6 for Elmer. Elmer returned to Ladysmith 2 years later at Bob's request.

1975 was also the year that Cadillac produced, for 1976 a car that was supposed to be impossible to break into. We were camped on Kingsway, a short distance from Boundary Road when my family watched a new owner, accidentally; lock his keys in the car. A locksmith was called and he could not 'enter' the new Cadillac. 2 hours later a cop car arrived with an Agassiz inmate in the back seat. It took him all of 35 seconds to unlock the new Cadillac.

I went on to play in many more Canadian Championships both here and in the East but none, including my first place finish in the Elder division just a few years ago, have come close to the thrill of that 1975 tournament. Both Bob Timothy and Murray Rayner (who finished third) are both in the B.C. Hall of Fame. Elmer succumbed to Cancer after setting a multitude of scoring records that only now have been surpassed by the present World Champion, Alan Francis.

The proposal would allow for expansion by the Pickle Ball Association and at the same time Guarantee a minimum of 5 Pits for the Horseshoe Club together with a provision to set aside land

#### 2017 BC 55+ Games – DON MYRFIELD

BC 55+ Games in Vernon brought an economic impact of 3.3 million to the local area. The Games had a surplus of approximately \$50,000.00 at the completion of the Games which was put into a Legacy Fund.

The 27 sports that were in the Games were notified that they could apply for funding from the Legacy Fund to promote their sport and encourage Seniors participation. Of the 22 sports that applied, 13 were chosen. The Vernon Horseshoe Club was one of the sports chosen and they received \$3500.00 to enhance their weather / shade

The regular league play will start on April 5 and continue to the end of July.


Last summer and fall we held a Thursday night open house for anyone who wanted to show up and play. This proved very popular and attracted outside interest in the sport, we will continue the program this year.


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### PLAYER PROFIDLE - SCOTT O'NEIL - LINDA FLODEN - SAM TOMASEVIC



#### A TRIBUTE TO GORDON BUTTS – JERRY MELISSA

Gordie Butts was more than just a friend and horseshoe player. He and his brother before him epitomized what Horseshoes and Life was all about.

It seems like only yesterday that I met Gordie for the first time, on the pitches at Cumberland. The year was 1998 and he was defending his 'International Championship' at the time. He loved that tournament. For me it was my first tournament back after being away from the game for a number of years. We talked at great length about his older brother Colin, deceased for a number of years. Colin was a founding member of the Victoria Horseshoe Club and directed some outstanding tournaments: he also had a pitch in his back yard where he invited people to come and play. Gordie had the same arrangement and I spent an afternoon or two in each of their back yards. Gordie won that tournament, the second of his five International titles.

Gordie attended many Canadian Championships. And, the most memorable was in Quebec when both of us tried to play the best under unbelievable circumstances. For me, it was a frustrating exercise, but Gordie thought the whole experience was a 'hoot'!

He was like that! A traditionalist who believed in both the 40 foot game and 50 point cancellation format! To win was wonderful, but to compete was awesome.

Port Renfrew in June will miss Gordie. He loved netting 'houlihans' and feeding family and friends.

I missed his presence at the pits this year! We all knew his illness was serious. Nothing less would have kept him away from the game he loved so much.

I, along with others could write a book about our experiences with Gordie. He was 'special'!



#### Thomas A. HAWKINS (December 25, 1920 - February 03, 2018)

Tom was fourth of five born to Milton & Beatrice (Ambler) on a homestead at Bapaume, Saskatchewan. In 1946, after serving in the <u>army</u> during WW II, he & Jean settled in Victoria where they raised their family of six. Along with partners he established and operated a successful marine hardware business on Wharf St. for +/- 30 years, eventually semi-retiring in the mid 1980s. Outside of family and work Tom's main interests were Freemasonry and community sports, notably minor baseball & horseshoes. Over the years he took on prominent leadership roles at local and provincial levels in those



### "Pep Talk" Corner

#### Sportsmanship and Conduct



Our "Four Dead" newsletter Summer 2017, Volume XXVIII #2, topic dealt with CONFIDENCE. The more you participate in any endeavor, the more proficient you become. That creates CONFIDENCE and an even more desire to do better. In our sport proficiency is measured in

percentages, (class of level based on ringers).

This article deals with improvement thru new information. Your game is where it's at based on what you now know and use. To achieve a higher ringer %, a change must take place, or you stay where your % is.

There are two areas of competition that would seem hidden in the background, they are "Sportsmanship and Conduct". No one wants to compete with others who have a "sour" attitude. We learn mostly by observation and information shared by way of tips from fellow contestants. We strive to be better players, more informed players, to rise through the ranks of percentages to compete with those currently ahead of us.

Some are of the thought that the two elements of "Sportsmanship and Conduct" are not more than a division between a good or bad attitude. John McEnroe, a famous tennis player, was recognized as a tennis "Bad Boy" due to his on-court attitude display. Many of our top athletes in all major sports started out at a young age. Through the years they crossed paths with many "A-Coach" helping them along the path to success. One can teach the physical aspects of a given activity, but attitude is NOT TEACHABLE. We can only explain about what Good or Bad influence it can have regarding advancement towards success.

To wit: getting PO'd only creates a sure way towards failure. Attitude gets in the way of not being able to stay loose; relaxation and concentration are lost when trying to fix something that isn't broken. Play becomes even worse. Verbalizing discontent, coupled with poor body language or poor speech, is detrimental to all who are around such actions.

Poor sportsmanship or display doesn't do well for our sport, especially in the eyes of spectators who may be contemplating indulging in our sport. Conduct as outlined in the "BY-LAWS" of the Idaho State Horseshoe Pitchers Association and the NHPA rules: "No player may indulge in actions, words or phrases disturbing an opponent, nor will profanity or abusive language be permitted on tournament or league grounds." It is the responsibility of all of us to see that we police ourselves, if for no reason other than the integrity of the sport.

In another sport similar to horseshoe pitching, the sport of bowling, poor attitudes are on display at each and every league or tournament event. It ruins the fun and comradery of association among other members. It kills the fun of play.

Being of good sport and conduct leads to better play, fun, and comradery for all who enjoy the challenges, along with the potential frustration of the sport. There are those who share ideas and tips with others in hopes it may improve their game. But why share valuable information and tips with someone of poor sportsmanship or conduct? It may turn out to be a waste. Next publication: WINNING

#### LADYSMITH HORSESHOE CLUB - VINCE HERHEL






With longer days and hopefully warmer temps coming I'm sure everybody is itching to get back into pitching horseshoes.
