1, WHEN DID YOU ACTUALLY START PLAYING HORSESHOES, WE KNOW YOUR FROM QUEBEC, DID YOU PLAY AT ALL IN THAT PROVINCE.



In 1986 we are two couples who decided to go camping. On Friday night we hook up the trailer tent and we left for Cowansville, Quebec, it's only an hour from our house, when we got there we put up the trailer tent we went for a walk, further there was a group, we went to see them and they where throwing horseshoes we watch them it seam like a very interesting game, so we stood there to see how they where playing that game, I wanted to try but the men

said it was to dark to play he said come back tomorrow morning I will let you know everything you need to know to play that game, ok I'll see you tomorrow morning. I haven't sleep very well that night; at seven I was up and ready and anxious to learn the game. I saw a square box of sand with a post in the middle, I look around for a horseshoe, no luck and as I look around I saw the men coming with in his hands the horseshoes so he ask me if I play any sport yes I said I'm a pitcher at softball really he said so I'm I so how comfortable are you at pitching? well I'm good for my opponent, I can't make my ball work, I can't make my ball work, I'm always in the strike zone they hit me like crazy. It is different because I'm use to play in sand, the Canadians and the world, you play in clay it is very different. On clay, it's not like sands your shoes doesn't react the same way, You have to learn to flip over the clay and it's not easy for a lady, clay is heavy and muddy you need to know how much water to pour on it, not enough the clay is too hard and the shoes bounce and too much water it's to muddy. I learn by experience that it is an advantage to know how to turn the



clay over. One year, it was hard for me to turn the clay so for that game, my opponent husband offer me to do the clay for me, what a nice guy, I said to my self! But he knew exactly how to turn and water the clay for her so she had an advantage on me.

5. HOW MANY HOURS A DAY DID YOU PRACTISE IN YOUR GLORY DAYS

I practise about 1 to 2 hours a day some time more. When I first start playing we had a tournament every Sunday, then a club close there door, then an other year an other one close also close so you use at Sunday to practise.





This great picture is a courtesy of Lloyd Reyklin, a long time member of the BC horseshoe association from New Westminster. Lloyd was BC Men's champion in 1996. But as a kid he had the chance to see many of the province's horseshoe legends. The picture was taken following an unidentified BC tournament from the mid to late 1930s. From left to right, here are some players that have been identified: 1st post to the right is Hugh Gallant holding shoes, and W.A. MacKenzie holding shoes up high. Right of the 2nd post is Art Kindlan (10-time BC champion) and next to him is the President of the Haney/Pitt Meadows Club (he never plays). The lady with the tam, looking at the other lady is Lloyd Reyklin's mother and sister. In front of his sister is Lloyd and behind her is Lloyd's dad showing only his hat. Hopefully we can eventually indentify the other pitchers and the event where the picture was taken... Lloyd Reyklin 'S father was a good pitcher too. Take a look at this 1934 scoresheet, by far the oldest horseshoe scoresheet ever found in Canada!




HOLD 2 PAIRS OF HORSESHOES

This special scoresheet is the oldest ever found in Canada. It reproduces a game played in 1934 at the Greater Vancouver Horseshoe Club. The scorekeeper was W.A. McKenzie, probably the greatest volunteer of the game in B.C. for that early period. It also gives us an idea of the caliber of play from the 1930's. Jimmy Porter was to be B.C. Provincial Champion later in 1945 and 1946. The 1934 B.C. Champion was T. Berry from Langley. But the 1930s were dominated by Art Kindlan who won 10 titles from 1931 to 1943. The scoresheet presented above was published in the 1982 Canadian Championships Souvenir Program. The Reyklin involved in the game is the father of Lloyd Reyklin who won the B.C. Provincials in 1996.
