BCHA - HALL OF FAME - 2018 INDUCTEE - PRFOMOTER / ORGANIZER - FRED ORMISTON - VICTORIA



Fred joined Greater Victoria Horseshoe club in 1978. As a member he got involved in the running of the club by being on the Executive from 1993-2000, and president from 1994-1998.

As president he was involved in the following major tournaments, 1996 BC championships, 1997 Island Championships, and 1998 Canadian Championships.

Fred was project manager for many upgrades of the club, such as 30ft roofs, tool shed expansion, kitchen and washroom expansion, and the main hall expansion. His expertise as a electrician was invaluable during these projects.

In 1999 Fred organized a club trip to Reno. And he was a member of the famous Mesachie Lake 6. In 1999 Fred was awarded a lifetime membership with GVHPA.

He was elected as a regional director for BC Horseshoes from 1998-2009, before becoming Vice President of BC Horseshoe Association in 2010-13. He was Hall of Fame director from 1999-2013. BC rep, to the Canadian Hall of Fame 2001-2013. In 2000 he was involved in the BC constitution and bylaws revision.

Fred was also involved as a delegate at the Canadian Championships 4 times and was instrumental in bringing the 2008 Canadian Championships to Victoria B.C.

As a player he competed locally on the Island and BC and traveling far away. In 2000, he won the Men's C at the Canadians, and played in 2 world Championships, in 2000 Bismarck ND, and 2002 in Red Deer Alberta.

It is wonderful for BC Horseshoes to have Men like Fred that played and was not afraid to get involved and get to work to better the sport of horseshoes wherever he went..

FROM FRED: I'm very honored to be inducted and join such a prestige's group horseshoe players. Now Carol can't hold anything over me as now we are both in the Hall of Fame. I will always cherish this award and who knows I might start playing again.

BC HORSESHOE ASSOCIATION LIFE TIME MEMBERSHIP AWARD BY SAM TOMASEVIC



The association is extremely proud to announce that **Bernie Lepper** has been awarded a lifetime membership to the BC Horseshoe Association, Bernie and I go back to 1969 when we met at the Central Park courts. Since that time Bernie became a part of my life, a mentor who taught me to run tournaments, became a goof friend of my parents and of course Wendy. I had the pleasure of meeting Bernie's first wife, June, who passed away too young from cancer.

Bernie started playing horseshoes in 1957 at Stanley Park, that's 61 years ago,

Bernie was inducted into the BC Horseshoe Association in 2012, as a organizer / promoter.

In 1962 the Greater Vancouver Horseshoe Pitchers Association was formed and the following year, 1963 this association was officially affiliated with the NHPA and most members in Canada at that time were from BC and Ontario. The secretary from this association to the NHPA from 1963-1970 was Bernie Lepper

Bernie was one of the founding fathers of the BCHA. The first meeting to organize the BCHA was held in 1970 in Vancouver at Stan Pachota's residence who was a member of the Greater Vancouver Horseshoe Club. Bernie was the 1st secretary/Treasurer, news editor and statistician. Bernie with the assistance of the other board members found grants that we could apply for.

Bernie along with other executive members saw to it that the Canadian Championships continued when Horseshoe Canada was having problems.

Over the years Bernie has been President of the Central Park Horseshoe Club where under his leadership the membership more than doubled. He later was also the President of the North Shore Horseshoe Club

Bernie has accomplished a lot for the good of horseshoes. He is always willing to assist others and give guidance when needed

Today, Bernie still plays the game as an Elder and he lives in Winfield.





Steve and Gail Bishop are great assets to our association and we are happy to have them.




Our membership numbers are holding well with 28 members and 5 juniors. We are confident that these numbers will increase next year as Sooke is final figuring out what the sport is all about.

Hello to all BC Clubs and their members.


We hope all BC Clubs had a great season of pitching shoes. As for Cloverdale our season has been wonderful with good weather and many successful events during the 2018 pitching season.
