



The Forensics of Horseshoe Pitching (Tournament Play): Well, win or lose in a game of horseshoes and it really doesn't matter. During competitive tournament games you'll hear such lingo as 2 Dead No Score / 2 Dead 1 / and for those more advanced players you'll hear 4 Dead.... When a judge is needed, call in the Coroner (Judge) to find out whose shoe is closest to the pin. Yup... even Horseshoes has its forensics.... If someone had told me ten years

ago that I'd be Pitching Horseshoes, I would have asked them what planet they were from... in all seriousness, I would have.

PLAYER PROFILE - GVHPA Member - Dennis Guevin


Dennis was introduced to Horseshoes in 2014 by Bernie Montpetit, a family





MYSTERY MONEY TOURNAMENT - CASEY SLUYS - CALIFORNIA

What is a mystery money tournament you ask? Here's how we run it. A \$10.00 entry fee, each pitcher receives an envelope when they get their round robin card with \$6.00 in it. There are 4 one dollar bills, 6 quarters, 3 dimes, 3 nickels and 5 pennies. This mixture of coins and bills can be divided in half numerous times. You can arrange in 6, 7 or 8 person groups.



Player A wins game 1 collects 1/2 of the opponents money from his envelope adding it to their envelope, leaving the loser with \$3 and player A with \$9.

Player A wins game 2 and collect 1/2 of his opponent's money again, if his opponent won his first game then player A will get \$4.50 and now have \$13.50 in their envelope.

All players must add the money they exchange to their envelopes and at the end of RR play the winner of the group should have the

most money. There are no other monetary awards. It's a fascinating tournament and becomes enjoyable and entertaining. It takes a little effort to get the envelopes together, but it's worth it.




