

2019 World Horseshoe Tournament - Wichita Falls Texas USA - Lindsay Hodgins

The 2019 World Horseshoe Pitching Tournament in Wichita Falls Texas hosted July 22 – August 3 was an amazing experience and opportunity. Being the top women's player in my province, this tournament gave me the chance to play against other great top level horseshoe players.

My amazing Gramps (aka my grandpa) and I arrived Friday. With some time before the world tournament started for me, I was able to watch the juniors and cadets pitch in their championship classes, then the next day practiced in the Backyard Doubles Tournament. I was lucky enough to be partnered with Toni Sloper from Wisconsin.

We managed to win 2 games and lost 2 in the double knock out play. During this tournament the media was performing at a high level making sure they covered as many players as they could along with myself, Gramps and a fellow BC player; Dalton Moffat.



That night we made it on Texoma news which was super exciting right before the tournament started for me.

Monday, when the real games started, it was a lot of fun. Most of the spectators for my game and players were people who supported me when I was playing as a junior up until now. Some I was playing against. Many of my fellow horseshoe pitchers noticed

something special about how I pitched; left handed. While playing in the preliminaries, some players ended up becoming distracted by my pitching and encouraged me to wait for them to pitch if they made it to the platform first. By doing so, I had a hard time focusing on my pitch but kept a level head and managed to pull it back in the championship round. I finished the first 15 games 8.5-6.5. This being my first year playing at the worlds with the ladies, I didn't pitch as well as I would have liked leading me to a 6th place finish in the Ladies A division. However, because I pitched the 5th highest average, this gave me a chance to pitch with the final 16 in the championship round.

Championship round was here and I was ready to go. I started to pick up my game going 5-0 for the first day.

To explore Texas a bit, before the second day of play Wei, Bob, Jane and myself all went as a group to check out a bird rehab facility (of course), then went for 15 minute hike to Wichita Falls, were I saw some Mississippi Kites flying overhead (something I was excited to see). Coincidently we ran into Alan, Alex, and Amy Francis (which I pitch the first day of the championship round) who had the same idea to checking out the falls. All definitely extremely friendly players, asking if I won all my games the first day, and saying win them all today.

Moreover, with the amazing competition of the championship, I was having really long games. Such as a 94 shoe game with Karen Graham who edged me out 37 to 40 and an 82 shoe game against Joan Elmore. My game with Joan Elmore was easily a major highlight of my trip. I pitched 31 ringers in a row. Joan played her heart out by pitching an 80% game against my 90.24%, an amazing feat in itself. Saturday, the last day to declare a champion was definitely an uphill battle as the first 3 games were against 3 of the front runners of the competition. First game was last year's world champion Maxine Griffith, followed by her twin sister Marlene Ray (my second loss), Doris Hiedan (another good close game, where Doris got ahead right off the bat), Aleena Lepak (junior shift director both years I pitched as a junior), and Penny Steinke. Finished the 15 games 13-2, and thanks to Joan, I was tied with Marlene, one of the top competitors in the division. We ended up having a playoff game and again I took off hitting 21 ringers in a row before a miss. Not believing I was in a playoff for first, I was still thinking "I can't get worse than second". As the game went on, that thought quickly switched to "I could win this". Not to long after that the game ended, and I took the win. I couldn't believe it; my first world title in the ladies division! It was also my first time in the ladies division at the World Tournament! This experience really taught me, that your mindset is everything!



Finally, I could not have won the world title without the help and support of so many people in my life such as: The GVHPA, Bruce and Vivian Bodnaruk (my coach as a junior), my Gramps for always taking me to tournaments and being my biggest supporter, Roland Loiselle for driving to Ladysmith the last couple of years for league nights. Also, Sam and Wendy for doing a great job at the Central park club, BCHA, gathering raffle prizes, and ongoing support. As well I would like to thank Vince and the Ladysmith club for the support and donations towards my last couple world tournament travel expenses, both my league

captains Brenda and Betty, Inge from Norway for showing me a new way to pitch in 2013 that changed my pitching forever, Nicole Dabney for being one of my closest friends and role models, Jerry Melissa and Tony Rondow for being role models, the women's who helped me grow as a pitcher when I was pacing, the ones who worked hard to make every tournament a success, Lou Busch for being a supporter, Margaret for getting me hooked on Snyder's horseshoes, and lastly everyone who has shown me ongoing support by either watching me pitch or pitching with me!

There are too many people to name, so I'm sorry if I forgot anyone. Thanks to everyone in the BCHA for helping me become the pitcher I am today! START PITCHIN!






CENTRAL PARK CLUB REPORT – BOB AND DARLENE SALISBURY

After doing this program for 3 years, we have basically seen the same people winning the awards each year,

For 2019-2020 (Beginning with the Winfield tournament August 17, 2019 – August 15, 2020) achievement awards will be done in a percentage range, separate for each category as follows:

MEN 1-25%, 26-40%, over 40%, same for WOMEN and ELDERS. Juniors and cadets will be combined with the following, 1-25% and 26%+

From each percentage group we will determine the following:

Highest Game, Greatest Number of Wins and Most Improved Player. More players will have a chance to win an award.

In the men's a total of 9 certificates will be awarded, same in the elders and women, the juniors/cadets will have 6 awards, 33 total awards will be given out, at the present time we have 21.



Most improved will be calculated by taking your beginning average (Aug. 17, 2019) and what your ending average (Aug 15, 2020), the one with the biggest increase wins. To be eligible you must have played in a minimum of 3 tournaments during this period.

Unless, the Western Classic, Canadian and world tournaments are help in our province, the results will not be included as not everyone has the opportunity to attend. Tournaments you play in the rest of Canada and the United States will also not be included.

The award for oldest active player will still be given out.

the wins you have in that tournament and see if your high game exceeds what you have already shot.

If you win an award, you can not win it again the following year unless you move up to the next percentage range. EXAMPLE – If you win most wins in the 1-25% range you can only win it again if you move up to the 26-40% category.



Sooke Horseshoe Pitching Association has had a very great year.







BCHA HALL OF FAME 2019 INDUCTEE Wilf Gregory – Ladysmith

On a particular day in 1995 at the age of 73, Wilf was walking by the horseshoe pitches in Bowen Park in Nanaimo, where a man and lady were throwing horseshoes. Wilf stood by the fence and watched as these two players put ringer after ringer around the pegs. The lady

these two players put ringer after ringer around the pegs. The lady asked him if he had ever tried throwing horseshoes and if he would like to give it a try. Wilf gave it a try and with some encouragement and help about how to throw a horseshoe Wilf got hooked. The lady gave Wilf a pair of Diamond horseshoes to practise and play with and the names of those two Bowen Park horseshoe players were Bernice Busch and Murray Rayner.

Wilf, being in good health at the age of 73, started out in 1995 as a 40 foot horseshoe pitcher and played in his first BC Horseshoe Pitching

Championships in North Vancouver playing in the Men's Class F division where he placed 2nd and over the next 12 years Wilf attended about a hundred or more tournaments,

the 2002 BC Champion, the 2002 BC International Champion and the 2002 Canadian Champion, Wilf, at the age of 80 was a Canadian Triple Crown Horseshoe Champion.

Wilf qualified to play in the World Elders Class A round robin event as the #1 Canadian seed. To give you an idea of how tough the competition was at the World's, the top player from Indiana had an entry ringer % of 84.32. At the end of the preliminary round Wilf placed 14th and did not make it into the championship round, but he got the opportunity to play against the world's best 30 foot

During his twelve year horseshoe pitching career, age 73 to 85, Wilf won first place or placed in the top three in almost every BC horseshoe tournament he entered. To say the least he was a real competitor and his on court conduct was exemplary and he was a real gentleman of the sport of horseshoe pitching.


