

Hello horseshoe family! Wei and I have been most fortunate to have discovered Horseshoes, although it has been a roundabout route.

Wei and I became acquainted in Vancouver in 2009. It was in the old Hudson's Bay building. We met in the revolving door and have been going around ever since.

When we met I was recently retired from my 32 year career as a teacher and had spent most of that time in the Yukon. I had most recently been in Dawson City for the previous twenty years teaching math, science and Tech Ed (shop programs). Wei was an Electronics Engineer and was working remotely for a



company in Beijing as an integrated circuit designer. She was soon eligible to retire and we were then able to travel and enjoy some sunny climates.

In 2014 we were travelling in Mexico and wound up at a surfing town on the far south Pacific coast called Puerto Escondido. It was there that we first tried our hand at horseshoes, playing in the sand at Brad's Split CocoNut, a beach bar popular with the established gringo residents and visitors alike. I have to admit that we were not too successful, and being the most recent newcomers where on the lower rungs of the social ladder. When we left Puerto we resolved to learn how to play better.

On arriving back in Vancouver we researched horseshoe facilities and found that the closest one to us was the Central Park Club, which by sheer coincidence was having an open house that very weekend. Several members from that club and other visitors recall seeing this new couple watching wistfully over the fence and being invited to come in!

Over the next few months under the careful tutelage of Jim Ball and Elyse Brunelle we progressed well much to our surprise! When we returned to Puerto the following year we did so well that we felt we had arrived into the highest level of beach bar society and were invited to all the best parties!

Thankfully horseshoe society isn't as snooty here in BC, and we have had some interesting if not actually exciting experiences in our competitions over the last few years. We have been to four Canadian Championships when they were held in Victoria, Guelph (Ontario), Whitewood (Saskatchewan) and Brampton (Ontario). In 2019 we went to the World's in Wichita Falls, Texas where we had the thrilling experience of being present when Lindsay won the Ladies World Championship. Final tie breaker game - she threw 31 ringers in a row at the start and wound up with an 89% ringer average for that game. Gramps was three feet off the ground!

As far as our own results go our wins have been intermittent, however we have made a lot of friends (euphemism for losing)! Mostly, I would say that in competition we have learned a lot. At the Canadian's in Victoria (2016) Wei won her division (Ladies E) with 14 straight wins. I finished second in Elders C, having faded in my last game to the eventual winner, Emvie Antonio.

Provincially and locally we have been to many tournaments averaging twelve to fourteen per year, again gathering a lot of experience and making friends. One year I received an award for most games won by an Elder- 73. They didn't say how many I had lost tho! At Abbotsford in 2017 I won the Provincial Elders A.



So I didn't make many friends there! In 2019 at the Provincial's in Victoria I found myself in tie breaker final in Elders A with Rick Britz, who many of you will know as a formidable opponent. He initially took a long lead but I crept up and eventually ended the game securing the win with a timely six pack.

This was probably my most exciting game, plus Tom Moffat captured it on his trusty I Phone and it is posted somewhere on facebook.



The COVID lockdown has been brutal to all clubs. We have found some satisfaction in playing on line games, either mail ins or live video. Some have pooh-poohed this diversion but since it's the only game in town we have tried it. It is really different but it still keeps us interested and in practice. Plus we can follow all COVID protocols. I gotta recommend it!

Horseshoes can be a fickle mistress (or master). When at Guelph early in our HS careers both Wei and I received the Most Improved Award for all of Canada. Since then, improvement has been less rapid with the occasional reversal. We both sometimes get on a plateau that we just can't seem to break through. Of course there are also the various results depending on the day or the mood. We commiserate in each other's struggles and celebrate each other's victories. We often practice together and make up horseshoe games so that we can compete together. After all, we are training for the future, a future where things return to normal and we can play with others at our own club, and even have inter-club events. Remember those days?

Wei and I would like to give a big shout out to all the horseshoe players we've met over these past few years. Your, competitive yet friendly spirit does not go unnoticed. Together we can grow this sport over the coming years and perhaps some year we'll be recognized to be at least the equivalent of break dancing and - as Sam T says - next stop Olympics! To all members of BC Horseshoe Association, I know like me, you are all probably tired of these Covid 19 restrictions, but we live in this different world now and have to adjust. So we need to keep the eye open on surviving this pandemic and getting back to the things we love in this life.

The BCHA executive had a zoom meeting Monday Feb 8, 2021 to discuss where we are at this point for horseshoes in the province.

We still have the existing guidelines for horseshoes in BC which you all have read and are available in our newsletters and bulletins. These are in place till they are removed by BCHA.

Maximum 2 players per court, using every other court, 6ft distance and cleaning of any equipment and using only your own shoes. There may be some further restrictions added by your local municipality as each one has different takes on what to do. Please follow these guidelines and any other that is added locally.

The amount of dues to be remitted to the BCHA (\$14.00 or \$22.00) for each member of your Club has not yet been determined. We will continue to monitor the Covid 19 restrictions and as per the resolution passed at the AGM last year, we will be making a decision on April 1st

We also look forward to any tournaments that can be played this year, even though we must also plan for alternatives. We are hoping to get the BC International and BC Championships in but we have to wait to see what transpires.

For now clubs can organize some, **IN HOUSE CLUB FUN EVENTS tournaments**, meaning only local registered players from that club. No traveling. These stats will be recorded in canstats.

Also some backyard style mail in tournaments like last year can be held also. Stats from these will be kept but in the Backyard category of canstats not the regular stats. Well enough for me now. Stay safe and let the ringers fly.

I recall Dave and I playing in the last Summer Games in Summerland that included Horseshoe Pitching and we both won Gold Medals in our Divisions (C), can't recall the year but a large group of juniors and players travelled together and fun was had by all. We've played in Calgary twice, Saskatchewan once and travelled every year to Bellingham to play in their 3rd weekend in August, the Bellingham International tournament. Another instance where a large contingent of players travelled together for a fun weekend across the border.

We married in 1971 so it's our 50th Anniversary coming up in April. My how time flies. We have 2 children, Steve and Calley, both of whom we introduced to the sport. Steve was a little dangerous with the shoe so decided it wasn't for him. Calley enjoyed playing and was a member of the League for several years before work dictated her schedule so she stopped playing for a few years. You and Wendy had just gotten married around the beginning of our GVHPA days, if I recall correctly, So many memories and people and Dave and I are sitting here smiling and laughing at some of the stories and favorite times we've had.

Canadian troops, who had liberated their town and their country, were billeted all over the area immediately following the end of the war. It took quite some time and effort to dig up the bells, clean them, hoist and mount them up in the tower.

He approached the officers of the Canadian soldiers who had liberated Groningen and asked them, "What is the song of the Canadians". The officers responded "God save the King."

They then replied, "O Canada". No one had the sheet music to "O Canada", but a Chaplin in the Canadian Army who was stationed nearby had a good clear voice and he was summoned and sang "O Canada" a few times for the Chime Master who wrote down the notes.

He then climbed into the tower and for the first song to be played in that church in years; he played "O Canada" as a tribute to the soldiers who had liberated the town of Groningen, Holland.

IMPROVE YOUR GAME / TIPS – JERRY MELISSA

The game of Horseshoes has long been a 'backyard' activity for many families. Family reunions and corporate picnics have often included friendly games to see who can throw a horseshoe closest to the peg. For many it was the start of a lifetime activity that brought them much joy. Today, family get-togethers and Sunday picnics are fast becoming a thing of the past. They have been replaced by sports fully organized and regulated. The day of impromptu gatherings is gone. Children waiting too long to join or pursue a sport never catch up to their peers. For those, who feel they were never given the opportunity when young: horseshoes is for them. For others, its a game that will offer challenges like no other. You are never too old to begin the game. The game presents both individual and team participation. You can practice on your own at any time (many set up backyard courts in their yards) and there is no need for an opponent. It's just you and the 'peg'!

Club Instruction, record keeping, and social activities are all designed to increase your enjoyment of the game. And, if you should want to become involved in club chores, there is always room for you! The game of Horseshoes is the best bang for your buck, bar none. There is not another sporting activity that offers so much for so little expenditure. Equipment costs are less than \$100 (for life) and a yearly membership in a sanctioned club, costs less than a dinner date at the Keg! All club members, new or old, should enter tournaments as often as they can. It doesn't matter what one's ability, there's a spot for everyone. The trick is to find the time and enjoy each and every experience. Entry fees are less than a dinner date at Macdonald's.

Once you join a club you will begin the process of improving your game. While landing a shoe close to the peg is admirable, the main goal for everyone should be to throw a ringer! And getting a shoe to open onto the peg is an open secret: the trick is to the throw the shoe 40 or 30 feet using a proven test of time technique. To score ringers consistently you have to settle on one of two deliveries: a flip or a turn. A flip's success from 40 feet is not as good as a 'turn'! A turn's success from 30 feet is not as good as a 'flip'. In any case it is very important for a player to purchase an appropriate horseshoe. Personally I recommend the following: for those who want to throw a flip: EZ Flip. For those who want to throw a turn: 1 1/4=Ted Allans or 3/4=Alan Francis. (Keep in mind that there are variants: double flip; and 1 3/4 turn. Both are very difficult to throw). All begin with a designed standard grip that can be 'goggled'! Every club has someone that can show you by example each and every technique. Once you have decided on the type of delivery you wish to throw, stick with it. And practise, practise, practise.

Stance, steps, backswing and follow-through are personal preference. Ringer success will dictate what works! For me, I threw a 1 1/4 turn from 40 feet. My research showed that this turn garnered the most Championships. And the 'Ted Allen' was preferred by most of the top players. Took me 6 months, one hour a day to get the shoe to open. When I moved to a shorter distance, again my research showed me that the flip was preferred by most of the top players. And the 'Snyder EZ flip was the preferred shoe! Took me; 3 months to get the shoe to open.

Won my first Mens in 1978 throwing 1 1/4 Allens. The other in 2003, 1 3/4 throwing Imperials. My 5 Elder Championships were a flip: Sue Snyders.
