



HARRY CAMPBELL- CENTRAL PARK HORSESHOE CLUB – GAIL BREMER



Growing up in the depression, life was very hard. Jobs were scarce so to pass the time men threw horseshoes in an open field near Hurry's house. When the men stopped for a smoke break, it was Harry and his 8 and 9 year old friend's turn to play. As money was tight there were no luxuries like production shoes to throw. Instead Harry played with real horse shoes that sometimes still had the nails in them. Spontaneous informal games continued throughout his childhood years

and Hurry's ability to throw an accurate turning shoe grew.

Time for fun and games was cut short, as at the age of 14 Harry joined his father and brother in the elevator industry to help his family out financially. Initially he did installations and then graduated to the service department.



Harry is in an elite group of men in the "50 year Elevator Club" having worked 53 years in the industry.

In 1941 Harry put his career on hold as World War 11 was raging. Although he was underage he was accepted in the Navy. Stationed in Halifax, he earned the rank of Able Body 1st class torpedo rating. Shortly after earning the rank, the war ended so thankfully Harry did not have to utilize his education.



Peacetime found Harry enjoying a much happier life. He was reintroduced to horseshoes by his future father-in-law. If Harry was going to marry Vera and join the family, he had to know how to play horseshoes. Again using real, small, lightweight horse shoes Harry's father-in-law was an extremely skilled player. Although Harry never won a single game during the many family picnics or regular visits, Harry was welcomed into the family when he married Vera, his wife of 61 years.

Harry constructed a horseshoe pitch in his own back yard where he practiced regularly. His dedication to

the sport paid off, as Harry's ringer percentage increased and he was almost always victorious in the many RV outings and the annual Green Lake tournaments. It was during one of these informal tournaments that one of the RV members introduced Harry to the Central Park Horseshoe Club.

Upon retirement in 1988 Harry could be seen twice weekly at Central Park throwing shoes with his buddy's Johnny, Gary, Ed and mentor "Champ" Jim Ball. During his early days with the club there was a thought in the air that "if you weren't a 40 foot thrower, you weren't a player." Being put off by this attitude, Harry did not enter any tournaments for a long time. He was happy just having fun and good healthy competition with the club members and being featured three times by Mike McCardell.

After many years, and much encouragement and support from the club, as well as 80 years of practice, Harry entered his first tournament - the 2013 Kamloops BC Senior Games. Since he was the only competitor in the Elderly E division he felt that he should be awarded the gold, silver and bronze medals. But no, he was bumped up to D division. Competing against men with much higher averages, Harry held his own, finishing 4th in the 10 competitor field with a 5 -8 win loss record.

Although not medaling, Harry was recognized as the oldest competitor (age 88) and thus received a unique "moose trophy" which he proudly displays.

The following year, Harry competed in several local tournaments, as well as the 2014 BC Championships. Entered in the Elder D division, Harry had a 5-5 record with a game high of 46.66% and overall average of 27.2% earning him the SILVER medal. At the 2014 Cloverdale BC Senior Games he won the GOLD medal in the Elderly E division with a perfect 8-0 win loss record. In this tournament, Harry was recognized as a member of the only father-daughter team in the competition. Having reached his goal of winning gold medal and because of a few health issues one gets in their mid 90's Harry has retired as an active player.

He does remain an enthusiastic and keen supporter of the club. Harry holds fond memories of all the fun, friendship, support, mentorship and healthy competition he enjoyed on the pitch, as well as when throwing washer which is a game he introduced to the club.

If asked what advice Harry would give to others he jokingly says "throw a turning shoe with the correct hand. Anyone can throw a shoe right handed. Try your left hand." (Note: Harry is left handed). Horseshoes can be thoroughly enjoyed recreationally and competitively at any age. I'm glad I was introduced to it and have the pleasure of playing all these years.



POWELL RIVER – SYLVIA SHELDON

Our Horseshoe pits are located on the municipal grounds of the community Recreation Complex and with the Complex closed we were by default also closed. The pits however are located outside so several of our players dropped by to throw shoes but nothing official occurred.

Times are more promising in the year 2021 with our Recreation Complex open and functioning under Covid safety restrictions and now upon submitting our Horseshoe club safety plan we have been approved for resuming play. Our Sunday play will start in April and our Thursday league in May.

However due to on-going Covid concerns we are still not back to normal. Essential travel only restrictions limits us to only in-house tournaments and no sanctioned tournaments. As per BCHA recommendations we will be using alternate pits only (allowing space between players). This impacts the number of players able to play at one time so we will not be actively campaigning for new players this year. Nor will we have a canteen or have 50/50 draws.

Finally due to the inability to have a general meeting we have several positions open on the executive that will remain unfilled and may remain that way until life as it used to be resumes. The remaining executive members are very knowledgeable and able to work together to ensure that we here in Powell River can keep safe and keep playing horseshoes.

Last year the Horseshoe club in Powell River was unable to play.

ELAINE AND MAURICE STERN – ABBOTSFORD


We started playing horseshoes in about 1997 in Prince George. Ida and Herb Boshman taught us and we learned how much fun and how to meet so many great people.

Murray was born September 17, 1929 in Saskatchewan, the exact city is not known, but we know it was around the Morse area.

Murray moved from Saskatchewan to Vernon, B.C. in January 1949, at the age of 19. After that Murray moved to Youbou in 1951 and currently lives in Nanaimo.

Murray started playing horseshoes at an early age. His father would re-shoe their horses and the OLD shoes would be out into use for the "Horseshoe Games". All the family, 5 brothers and 6 sisters have all played the game at one time or another and even now, at any gathering you will hear the clang of shoes as another game is played with all the family, the children, the nieces and nephews, the grandchildren and the neighbors' participating.

Vancouver Island Men's Champion 1958, 1962, 1966, 1969, 1975 and 1981

He was the winner of many local and Provincial tournaments.

Murray is a quite individual who respects all horseshoe players, still a competitor and always willing to share his expertise with others.










